What?

Calculating your earnings helps to work out a realistic budget or a savings plan.



Why?

To understand how much money you will receive each pay period and over the year

Who?

- ✓ Job seekers look at salaries and wages in job postings to compare earnings for different positions.
- ✓ Hourly employees estimate how much money they will receive each pay period based on the hours they work.
- Salaried employees estimate how much money they will make before deductions each pay period by dividing their annual salary by the number of pay periods in a year.



15.3: Overtime



Overtime and Time Off in Lieu

Tamarack Inc. does not pay overtime hours to salaried staff except in extraordinary circumstances. Instead, employees shall be granted time off in lieu of pay.

Lieu time shall be granted on an hour-for-hour basis for all hours worked in one week in excess of 40 hours. Lieu time shall be granted at a rate of 1.5 (one and a half) hours of time off for every hour worked in one week in excess of 44 hours.

Staff should take lieu time as soon as they are able. No more than 40 hours of lieu time may be accumulated, except with the approval of a manager.

Employees must have a manager's approval prior to these situations:

- Working more than 44 hours in one week
- Taking lieu time
